



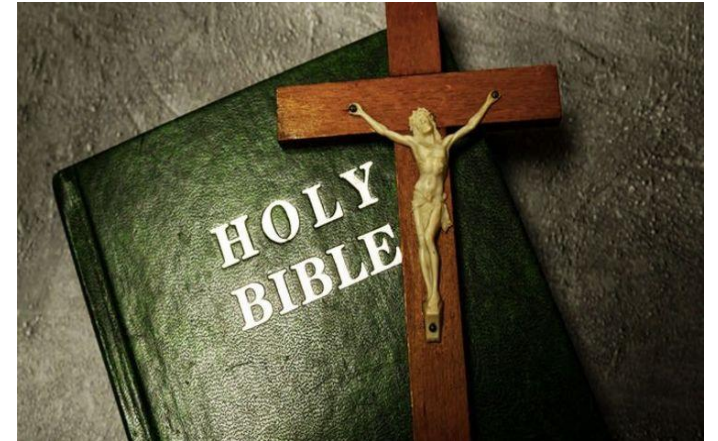

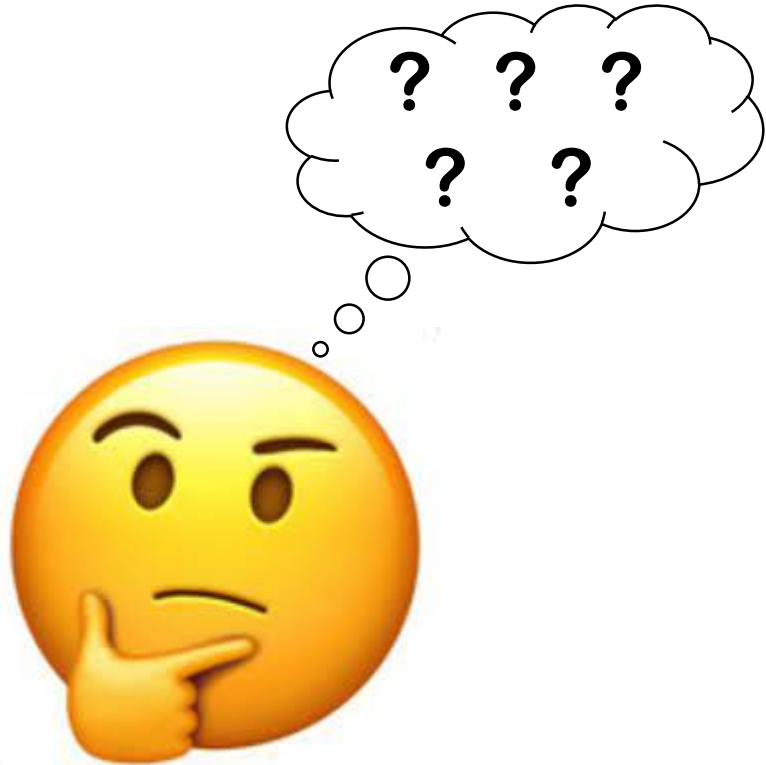
What is RE?

Religious Education is the study of religions and beliefs from around the world, including how people worship and their traditions.





In RE, we ask questions such as...



What do people of different religions believe?

How do they express their beliefs?

How do people of different faiths worship?

What celebrations and festivals are there in different religions?



RE Lessons

In RE, we learn about the different faiths of the world. How many world religions can you name?



We learn to discuss religious beliefs with respect, showing tolerance and understanding of the different views that people have. We respect religious differences in worship and traditions.

Questions we might consider in RE lessons....

How do Christians follow the example of Jesus?

Christians try to follow the example of Jesus in their day to day life. This may include being kind to others and only treating people how you would want to be treated yourself. It could also include charitable acts to help the less fortunate. For example, there are over 4,000 Christian food banks in the UK who distribute food to families in need.





Questions we might consider in RE lessons....

What similarities do religions share?

Religions usually have rituals that followers perform. Many religions have special books, such as the Bible. Religions set out rules or guidelines for how followers should live. Many religious rules have to do with treating others well and doing the right thing.

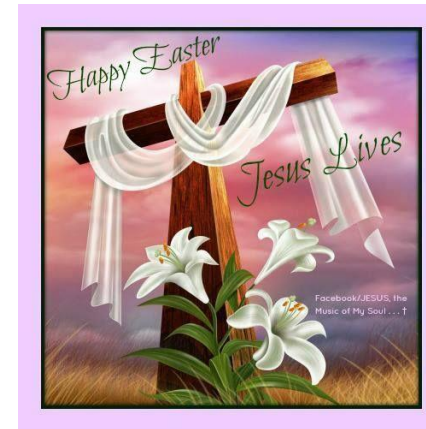

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What if I do not have a religion?

Many people do not have a religion or do not actively follow a religion. This is okay as everyone has the right to believe what they want. You can still get involved and learn about other religions and join in with their celebrations. Learning about someone else's faith makes us more tolerant.





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What if I do not have a religion?

If you do not follow a religion, you may believe one of the following:

Atheism - someone who does not believe in the existence of God.

Agnostic – Agnostics believe that it is impossible to know the truth about some things, such as God's existence. They do not accept or deny the existence of God.

Humanism – A belief that the world is a natural place and science provides the best way to understand it rather than superstition. They rely on the power of humanity.
